
COMMUNITY STEWARDSHIP REPORT

Donor Support takes many forms...

1. Breaking the silence at Breakfast of Champions

Olympian Clara Hughes shared her personal story of depression at Breakfast of Champions, helping to raise awareness and funds in support of mental health care.

\$362,201 - MRI for Breast Care Program

Joanne Barker (in Bust a Move shirt) cheered from the sidelines at the 2013 Bust a Move for Breast Health™ London, watching as her friends worked up a sweat in her honour. She would have participated herself, but having been diagnosed with breast cancer in September 2012, she was on her 7th round of chemotherapy, completely bald and not "feeling herself." But despite all these factors, Joanne was there as a volunteer. With renewed energy, Joanne returned for the 2014 Bust a Move for Breast Health London (with hair) excited to cheer on the crowd feeling more like herself, thanks to St. Joseph's Breast Care Program, and the expertise of her medical team.

Donor support helped complete the purchase of an MRI with breast imaging capabilities that detects any growth through dense breast tissue, so that patients like Joanne can have early detection for





\$630,000 - Patient Safety Initiative

St. Joseph's is embarking on a transformative clinical service delivery model called Healthcare Undergoing Optimization (HUGO) to enhance patient safety and quality of care that people receive in hospital. Donor support will help to purchase Workstations On Wheels (WOW) - a mobile work station that has a computer barcode scanner to reduce medication errors while increasing more time spent at the patient's bedside.

St. Joseph's is now utilizing Transcranial Magnetic Stimulation, to non-invasively increase or decrease brain activity, which can be applied to a wide variety of conditions. Research shows that TMS can help treat Alzheimer's disease, drug-resistant depression, obsessive-compulsive disorder, chronic pain, and migraines.

\$15,750 to purchase education carts for **Mount Hope Centre** for Long Term Care for mobile caregiver training.

\$21,480 to enhance the patient's experience at Parkwood Hospital with care and comfort items through the Parkwood Hospital Auxiliary Wish List.

\$187,838 to provide priority care and comfort items for patients and residents across St. Joseph's through the Season of Celebration. \$1,897 to train staff in the Rehabilitation Program at Parkwood Hospital to assess how blood flow has affected a lower limb through the purchase of a Doppler Ultrasound Machine.

\$2,545 to create a "living wall" to enhance the patient environment in the Therapeutic Garden in the a portable/digital piano Neurobehavioral enhancing Spiritual Care Rehabilitation Centre.





\$3,550 Brain 90X Group Treatment

Brain 90X is a group treatment approach through the Acquired Brain Injury (ABI) Program, which helps individuals cope with Post-Concussion Syndrome. The ABI team has also joined with Western University allowing the next generation of caregivers the opportunity to delve into research that could lead to new care outcomes.



\$5,850 Supporting nursing excellence

Nursing bursaries are awarded each year to support continuing education for nurses, helping to pay for tuition, research expenses, and development. They are awarded to nurses that exemplify St. Joseph's values, are positive role models for other nurses and show a commitment to compassionate care.

\$3,000 to advance leadership in the Rehabilitation Program through the Ontario Hospital Association's Leadership Competencies course.



- \$1,000 to support the Western Counties Wing Library at Parkwood Hospital with education resources.
- \$1,000 to enhance the personal and professional development of an employee who demonstrates excellent leadership qualities through the Joan Garrison Fund.
- **\$900** to purchase educational resources in orthopedics for the Robert M. McFarlane Library at St. Joseph's Hospital.

- \$1,000 to support patient education materials on eye conditions for the Ivey Eye Institute at St. Joseph's Hospital through the Marjorie Jean Jolliffe Fund.
- **\$1,000** to support the purchase of ophthalmic educational resources for the Ivey Eye Institute at St. Joseph's Hospital.

Because of Donor Support... St. Joseph's is advancing care through bench-to-bedside Research.

Donor support is creating a better quality of care for people living with a mental illness by improving client access and promoting regular health monitoring.



\$77,583 - Mental Health **Engagement Network**

With a tap of a finger, those living with mental illness can use the Lawson Health Research Institute SMART Record app to track their moods, receive reminders of medication refills and access their crisis plan in an emergency.

The Foundation, along with our partners at London Health Sciences Foundation, teamed up to provide six months of data service to ensure community based mental health patients could continue to have access to this innovative technology. Proceeds were provided through the annual Breakfast of Champions.

\$14,821 **Tools for self-management** of neurogenic bladder in spinal cord injury

To mitigate health issues related to spinal cord injury (SCI), research is taking place through Lawson's Aging, Rehabilitation and Geriatric Care Research Centre within Parkwood Hospital. The web-based, self-management program, will give people with a SCI tools for tracking their health and educational resources to reduce the likelihood of urinary tract infections and other bladder complications.



\$6,222 - Tumour Biobank

A first for London Ontario, the Breast Care Clinical Research and Tumour Biobank in Lawson Health Research Institute, housed at St. Joseph's Hospital, is a collection of tumour samples and clinical information from patients who've come to St. Joseph's for a biopsy. The \$6,222 is the initial disbursement to purchase computers to assist in data collection.



\$106.269 to advance research through the Douglas and **Vivian Bocking Chair** in Fetal and Newborn **Growth Fund.**

\$2,312 to fund the Canadian Centre for Activity & Aging Lecture Series through the Dr. Peter A. Rechnitzer Fund.

\$150,000 to enable research in the development of minimally invasive upper arm surgical intervention in the Surgical Mechatronics Laboratory.

\$170,000 to provide young researchers the opportunity to pursue research initiatives at Lawson Health Research Institute.

\$140,166 to support research through scientific leadership within Lawson Health Research Institute through the Beryl and Richard Ivey Research Chair in Rehabilitation and Geriatric Care.

The Foundation proudly granted \$1,578,125 for research, including...

\$13,000 to purchase a dedicated RT-PCR machine to help uncover the causes of glaucoma.

\$130,797 to support diabetes research through the Helen and Frances Lawson Chair in Diabetes Research.

\$33,400 to support research into the causes, prevention and treatment of mood disorders through the Dr. Joseph Rea Chair in Mood Disorders.

\$7,517 to support the research of molecular PET imaging to detect early stages of Type 2 diabetes.

\$225,524 to support the Research Chair in Human Microbiology and Probiotics at Lawson Health Research Institute.

\$10,158 to support research to review the treatment of pressure ulcers for people with a spinal cord injury.

\$3,100 to support research in the use of Community **Treatment** Orders for patients with severe mental



\$19,434 to obtain assistance for researchers to commercialize their discoveries through the Donald and Elizabeth R. Ness Endowment Fund.

\$24,980 to utilize the Canadian **Kidney Cancer Information**

System database to improve patient outcomes.

We're helping to meet critical health care needs through the effective management of **Donor Dollars**.

As the economy of the region and Ontario continues to experience a slow recovery, the generous support of the community is greatly appreciated.

Donation revenues of \$6.5 million remained steady, providing resources to St. Joseph's Health Care London for patient care, education and research.

Like other charitable organizations, costs have trended higher in the last fiscal year. To mitigate this trend and ensure donations have the greatest impact possible on patient and resident care, the Foundation has embarked on a strategic fundraising performance improvement strategy to increase donation revenue, build internal capacity and streamline our business practice.

The Foundation investments continue to show positive returns with a total return for the year of 9.9%. Investment income for the year of \$5.5 million was 38% higher than what was recorded in 2012-2013.

Total assets for the year grew by 11.4% to 62.3 million. Of that, the endowed funds grew to \$51.4 million and the restricted funds grew to \$9.2 million.

In 2013-2014 each dollar spent on fundraising resulted in an 84% return on that investment.

Through the generosity of the community, \$2.6 million in funds were granted to St. Joseph's Health Care London to support care for patients of today, and into the future.


On behalf of the finance committee and the board of directors, we are privileged to steward these precious resources on behalf of our donors to meet the critical health care needs of our community.

2013-2014 GRANT DISBURSEMENT








